Principal's Message

The end of Term 3 is rapidly approaching and so there is much that needs to be done in regards to preparing for the end of this year and in planning and preparation for 2021. This week, senior students were given revised exam timetables for the end of the year External Exams. NCEA students, in light of the fluidity of the situation at the moment, are urged to prepare thoroughly for the upcoming assessment week, as these results could in fact be the result for the year, should the current situation with external exams change again.

We continue with our policy of non-participation in interschool sports events so long as we remain at Alert Level 2, the decision was discussed and affirmed at the last Board of Trustees meeting. Considerations around guaranteeing safety at venues other than our own and also our own school were discussed, as was the presence of Covid-19 in our wider community. The decision was to err on the side of safety for our students and their whānau by not exposing them to risks outside of our control.

We continue to operate all of our safety measures in school and thank visitors to the site for their compliance with these. Together we will keep each other safe.

I am pleased to advise that we have enrolled to be part of the lunches in schools programme. The government is providing funds for this and the details of how we will be able to provide a healthy daily lunch to all students in the school are still being worked out, but will be relayed to our school community once it is all sorted.

As well we have been asked to participate in a project being administered by KidsCan but sponsored by the government, to provide "period supplies" to all girls in the school. An initial assembly has introduced the girls to the project, the personnel and the products available. This is to be followed up with workshops next week for the girls at different levels of the school.

So, lots happening and our young people can only benefit from what's on offer if they are attending school on a regular basis. Anxieties aside, we are all here to help.

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

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Dissections in C Module

As a teacher, I desire students to become confident, curious and capable in the science laboratory. Our module this term has been called "Statistics, Blood and Bones", and the students were warned at the start that there would be a dissection or two.





As part of the skeletal system, we started with a chicken wing dissection, demonstrating the bones, cartilages, tendons, ligaments and muscles. I was delighted to see students powering in and discovering the anatomy and "contracting" some muscles to make the wing flap. This gave me the confidence to introduce a heart dissection to demonstrate the circulatory system.

Butcher Dan at Putaruru Home Kill was able to give me a range of fresh hearts (without the smell) including Ox, Cow, Sheep and pig that the students could investigate. Some surprising aspects for the students were the blood clots, the thickness of the muscle, the connective tissue and valves and the sizes of the different animal hearts.

Science can often be perceived as too hard to understand so it is so important for teachers to find ways to connect the theory to things

students can do and see. We are grateful for the support of the community in making science real. Thanks Butcher Dan!
