Tuikura Wānanga Tuatahi Recap

Kia Ora e te Whānau

Last weekend, Harata and I took the opportunity to attend the first of three wānanga for a mean as kaupapa called Tuikura. This wānanga was held in the heart of te iwi o Pirirākau, just outside of Tauranga Moana at Paparoa Marae, Te Puna. Tuikura 'weaving schools' is a kaupapa set up for senior rangatahi Māori from kura all around the motu, where we come together three times a year to explore ngā pātai:

Nō hea koe? Ko wai koe? E haere ana koe ki hea?

Where are you from? Who are you? Where are you going?

Te kaupapa mō te wānanga tuatahi: Nō hea koe?

We dove deep into korero and whakaaro about Māori history, battles fought by our tūpuna, and what we can think about to contribute to our whānau, hapū, iwi, and Aotearoa in general today....all while exploring what makes us who we are, where we come from, and what a privilege it is, to be Māori. With about 12 tuakana who have all previously been involved in the Tuikura kaupapa, and 15 other rangatahi māori from all over the motu, we spent the weekend establishing lifelong connections, and engaging in korero that spark massive whakaaro like our revitalisation of te reo me ngā tikanga Māori, and reclamation of whenua. We think of ourselves as Māori today, and acknowledge the warriors that carved the pathway that allows us to express who we are now, while also recognising that our fight is still not over.

Being surrounded, supported, and connected to so many bright and talented Māori, gives me the confidence to say that the future of our culture is in very capable hands.

All round it was an amazing weekend, with an amazing kaupapa, surrounded by ngā rangatira mō apōpō.

One third down and it has already broadened our perspective on Te Ao Māori and Aotearoa as a whole, and not only our confidence in te reo, but our confidence in ourselves have grown. We owe the biggest thank you to Mr Ronke for making this experience possible and for creating the opportunity for us to be a part of this. A kaupapa set up BY Māori, FOR Māori, to ENHANCE Māori, where we have nothing to lose and everything to gain. An exciting journey that both Harata and I are so grateful to be a part of, and so eager to explore.

Bring on wānanga tuarua.
