


TOGETHER WE LEARN AND GROW







CARLI LAST - INCLUSION

Putāruru College is a place for all students to belong. We embrace diversity and show respect to each other through our school values Hīkina (advocacy for ourselves and others), Whanaungatanga (connections) and Mana Motuhake (identity). We are on a journey of transforming our school into an inclusive learning environment and a place for everyone to feel safe, happy and welcomed.

In 2022, we created a Hauora Hub where students with additional or special needs can learn in comfort and calm. The Hub is also open to all students at break times as a safe, inclusive room and a student-led

Tuakana Teina lunch club is starting in 2022 to support students who feel socially isolated or vulnerable. Putāruru College ensures students who need additional learning support get the assistance they need through a range of options including in class strategies, teacher aide support, liaising with other agencies including RTLB and Ministry of Education specialists.

CHANTEL OOSTHUIZEN - INNOVATION

Our experience through Covid and lockdowns over the last 2 years has highlighted the need for students and teachers to be more digitally literate. We are using google sites to create individual learning profiles and it is compulsory for each class to have a google classroom with weekly activities. This means students can access learning when they are at home, or wanting to deepen their knowledge. Gone are the days of 'chalk and talk', we are working with our teachers to learn new and exciting ways to deliver our localised curriculum, for example, padlet for group discussions.

In the future we would like to have one device available for every child and we currently have chromebooks or laptops for 75% of our students. We have an e-librarian to support students and teachers with devices and with enrollments to online schools such as Te Kura and Volcanics. At Putāruru College we are open to new ways of doing things, we strongly encourage and role model where possible being innovative and curious.



ROB ROGERS - PATHWAYS AND PARTNERSHIP

Our top priority for the pathways/careers team is to find, create and establish pathways for students transitioning through and then out of school. Using students' interests, needs and directions to explore opportunities for them to grow into. We are committed to showing students as wide a range of opportunities available to them to enable them to broaden their possible work identity. In conjunction with subject areas we have some discovery partnerships with industry with the specific focus of getting our junior students thinking about what options are out there available to them. Liaising with tertiary institutions has always been a key part of the senior provision of pathways and we are working to strengthen this area catering for the varied interests of our students. Students are encouraged to attend open days, career expos and work readiness programmes so that when they leave school they have had an exposure to a wide range of work experiences.

We continue to develop genuine partnerships with our communities. Local experts come in regularly to enhance the curriculum for example providing careers inspiration and supporting students with harakeke projects. We are active in local community groups, like Rotary. We are increasing our pathway and career opportunities through more work experience and supporting local projects such as tree planting.

TINIWAATA HILL - CULTURAL LEADER

Here at Putāruru College we endeavor to develop and maintain a positive culture in our school that is inclusive. We have started a journey on learning about the local history of our area, Ngāti Raukawa ki te Kaokaoroa o Pātetere and acknowledging mātauranga Māori through various wānanga (workshops) and are including this knowledge in the delivery of our Whānau Curriculum.

We are committed to developing and maintaining a positive relationship with our tauira, whānau, te hāpori, te iwi me ngā hapu in order to improve our practice and to support us with our curriculum and mātauranga.



The Putāruru College curriculum is made up of three interconnected strands.

Whānau | Learning Advisory

In Whānau | Learning Advisory we recognise that every student needs a strong sense of belonging and has an adult (whānau teacher) who will be a champion for each student's learning success. The whānau teacher will know each student well, will set goals with their students and their families, will monitor their progress and celebrate their successes. The group of 12 students from yr 7 to 13 will unpack our school values of Mana Motuhake,

Hīkina, Whānaungatanga and Kia tutuki as they explore what it looks like to live out the qualities of our graduate profile.

In whanau students will also learn some Te Reo Maori, explore local and global issues as well as working together to achieve high levels of hauora. Students will stay with their whānau teacher and class for their 7 years at Putāruru College. Students will know their strengths and use these to help others – the whānau group will have collective investment in the success of each other.

Wānaga Ako

Subject classes

In Wānaga Ako | Subject classes our programmes of learning are founded in the New Zealand Curriculum and are designed to support students moving to achieve in the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA). Our programmes will core (traditional subject based), or modules (contextualized learning). We are moving to a more integrated approach to learning as there are natural crossovers between authentic topics and themes. Every teacher will be supporting the teaching of literacy and numeracy schoolwide - so there will be transferable strategies learnt across classes.

We want learning at Putāruru College to be engaging, challenging and meaningful for students.

Rāapa Whakamua | Pathways & Projects

In Rāapa Whakamua | Pathways & Projects Day students will be given the opportunity to develop future focused skills they need as they work individually or in a team to manage a project from start to completion.

Our students will have the chance to follow their interests and passions in a way that is connected to the local community and makes a difference in the world. Rāapa Whakamua also supports students to complete life ready skill classes, work experience, Gateway

programmes and courses at tertiary institutions such as Toi Ohomai. We want students to be well prepared to face the challenges of University, other Tertiary Institutions and the world of work.

Rāapa Whakamua provides the opportunity for students to try out new things, take risks and challenge themselves while still at school so that when they do leave they are truly prepared for their future. Most of our Wednesday classes are teached-led, but we are working at this day being more project based in the future.





Our Curriculum is designed to be student-centered and learning-focused. From Year 7 through to Year 13, students are exposed to a range of core and optional subjects, leading to National Certificates in Educational Achievement (Levels 1-3).

In 2022 we introduced whānau classes and semesters. Semester A is the first half of the year while Semester B is the second half of the year.

Putāruru College students can expand their cultural awareness and knowledge through participation in Cultural Hour which is where we learn waiata and haka specific to Ngāti Raukawa and Tainui. The group supports college assemblies and other activities within the community. Last year, we introduced a Ngā Toi (The Arts) class which included a class in Mahi Whakairo (traditional Māori carving) which a number of students have engaged with. This year we celebrated Matariki with a Kaihākari that included whānau of our kura and the community. We are continuing with our Tikanga class for year 7 and 8 students and the senior Te Reo Māori programme continues to run to support students in learning Te Reo Māori.

We have an increasing number of Pasifika students, and enjoy celebrating Cook Island Languages Week. We look forward to celebrating all the cultures of our Putāruru College students

In the past we have been honoured to host several Japanese schools who visit New Zealand on a cultural exchange. The visits take place several times a year and are a real highlight of the year for our students. The Japanese students arrive to a traditional Powhiri welcome then rotate around the school learning the haka and stick games and teaching our students origami and Japanese songs. We are Facebook friends with a lot of ex visitors who really seem to embrace the Kiwi experience. These came to an abrupt end due to Covid but we are really pleased that we have recently confirmed our first return booking for 2023!



The College employs a sports coordinator who has a vital role in encouraging and organising activities throughout the year. The sports coordinator has a team of Sports leaders – senior students who work with the sports coordinator to organise sporting activities on a daily basis. The Tuakana Teina program also facilitates students getting involved in non-traditional activities at lunchtimes with the aim of creating social networks through physical activities.

In addition, parents play an important role in managing and coaching sports teams and their involvement is warmly welcomed. Students are encouraged to get involved in sports for the development of their physical well-being, team skills, competitiveness, self-discipline, resilience, friendships, commitment to the code and fair play.

At Putāruru College students have endless opportunities to grow their leadership. We have our head students who are taking a lead role in assemblies - growing their public speaking skills -, organizing activities for students and introducing new students to our kura. Whānau leaders are a group of 32 students who play a vital part during whānau time, not only do they display tuakana teina in their own group but they are also leading activities during this time. Our whānau leaders are part of a leadership program run by our own Principal!

Not only do we have sports leaders who are assisting with organisation in sports, but we also have cultural leaders who celebrate different cultures through creating awareness and fostering identity, which is part of our Mana Motuhake school value, seen in our Graduate Profile. Wera Aotearoa Charitable Trust (WACT) is working really closely with a group of future leaders, this program is running every Thursday. Our Interact Service group is working together to improve our communities and making connections through community and school projects.

Our latest addition to the list of leadership opportunities is our Tuakana Teina program. Our Tuakana Teina leaders are present in the Hauora hub during lunch times, running activities with students and ensuring inclusion is manifested in this space. The Tuakana Teina program is demonstrating Hīkina, Advocating for myself and others, from the Graduate Profile.

While we have some set leadership opportunities, we are also very open to creating new experiences and letting the students carve their own leadership paths!

ARTS

The Arts/ Ngā Toi includes Drama, Music, Painting and Drawing, Printmaking, Photography, Sculpture, Whakairo and Film and Media. Students have opportunities to learn how to use professional camera, sound and editing equipment in our state of the art film facilities and how to livestream important school events like Athletics Day, Prize Givings, Pōwhiri and other school celebrations. Over the years PCFilms extra-curricular group have won dozens of awards, prizes and national recognition. Check us out on PCFilmsNZ on Youtube.

Music Tuition is available for a variety of musical instruments including voice through our Itinerant Music Program (available for free). There are opportunities for students to perform, as the school band, at Achievers and Prize Giving Assemblies. Students can also join the Putāruru School of Music for a small fee which offers lessons after school.

This is the fifth year that Putāruru College Students have worked with Bluelight and the New Zealand Police to deliver the Cactus Program with our students. We can take up to 25 dedicated students who train three mornings a week for eight weeks, starting at 6am in the morning, to improve their fitness and challenge themselves both physically and mentally.
