Year 7-8 Swimming Safety Workshops

Our Y7-8 students have been lucky enough to participate in a series of swimming safety workshops run by some of the local instructors at the town pools. Some of the activities included the correct use of lifejackets, entering and exiting a rescue boat, buoyancy and propulsion techniques, and survival and rescuing strategies.

Thanks to Swimming Waikato who made this all possible via a community grant. This enabled us to have qualified instructors facilitate the programme and it also covered the main cost of transportation to and from the pools. Our students thoroughly enjoyed the experience and gained some much needed life skills that they can use when they're around water.

As a nurse, young people have shared with me that making an appointment and finding transport to their family general practice doctor (GP) can be daunting.

This is especially so for teenagers, who may need to talk about unfamiliar things like the changes happening to their bodies or their sexual health. For some families, financial concerns can also be a barrier to young people getting the care they need.

By having a free student health clinic on-site at the school, we aim to compliment the work their usual GP does and make it easier for all students to get access to the care they need, when they need it, by skilled doctors and nurses passionate about working with young people.

As part of the clinic's prevention focus, all Year 9 students will be invited to participate in a comprehensive health review and assessment throughout the year.
