






A lil bit of grey but a lot of fun!

### Our Term One programmes in English:

#### **Year 9s: Mythology Exploration**

This term, our Year 9s embark on a captivating journey into Greek, African, and Maori mythologies. A Year 9 Literacy class intertwines mythology and visual language, guiding a study on essential literacy fundamentals.

#### **Year 10s: Speculative Fiction Exploration**

In Year 10 classes this term, students delve into speculative fiction, refining various writing styles in preparation for the upcoming CAAs in Term 2.

#### Level 1: In-depth Exploration

At Level 1, two classes dive into the critical topics of racism, social issues, and global politics through essay writing. Simultaneously, the third class prepares students for workplace literacy, equipping them for future success.

#### ESL Class: English as a Second Language

Our ESL class is expanding to provide vital support to new arrivals to Aotearoa New Zealand, fostering a welcoming atmosphere within our school community.

#### Level 2 and Yr 13s

Level 2s are exploring texts significant to the understanding of social and political issues while working on critical analysis, film study and novel study while Yr 13s are taking a well earned break to use their skills to support camp this week and will pick up their books next week.

We wish everyone a term filled with exploration, creativity, and academic growth.

Remember it is an expectation of our courses that all students complete daily home reading and are completing all unfinished classwork at home before attending their next lesson.

The Year 10 English students have been practicing communication, listening, speaking, emailing and transcribing skills. As part of this, they have been working in small groups to organise interviews, create questions and conduct brief interviews.

Good afternoon Mrs

Curphey. My name is Rex, this is Ben, and this is Ethan. We are hoping to improve the school by talking to you about this.



#### Ben: "What are you trying to achieve?"

Mrs. Curphey: "I enjoy working here because when I went to school... we were told that the world was our oyster and we could do whatever we wanted to do. However, when I returned to NZ in 2014 and listened to some of the things that were happening, I didn't feel that students got the same message. I felt that was wrong. So, by getting a job here and doing what I do, I'm hoping that I'm making a bit of a difference."

**Matua Tini**, our next questions is: Do you enjoy working here and if you don't why don't you?

"I really do like working at Putāruru College. The students are great people to know and it's a privilege to get to work with them. I've got a great relationship with the community, students and staff.

I want our students to grow up proud to come from here, that's the gist of it."



Ms Hawkes: What changes or improvements would you like to see in the future to improve the school's environment?

"I think that the whole school needs an upgrade. We need to be using what we have in the school to make it a bit more interesting and exciting. The tennis court needs to be upgraded because we can't use it at the moment. We need more murals around the school, but I do know that Mr Moore is working on it."
