

What do you want to be when you grow up? A PE teacher because I love sport!



What are you looking forward to when you're a Y9? More challenging work and learning new things.






What's it like to not be the youngest student in the school now? It's better being a Y8 because we're bigger and not the youngest in the school anymore.


Who is your favourite teacher & why? Mrs Maxwell because she was nice as my teacher last year.

out the teacher and other students.


What's it like not being the youngest in the school? When I look at the Y7's I think that used to be us but now I feel a lot older and more respected.



Mostly everyone here is friendly and the teachers are kind.








Kura Kai Update
