These are IMPORTANT because (1) they provide good practice (2) they provide useful feedback from teachers (to highlight areas you need to improve) and (3) they provide valid evidence if, for some reason, you are unable to write the end-year exam.

Please note - you will either be writing an **EXAM** in the hall, or you will be **IN CLASS** studying/completing internal assessments. If you are writing a practice exam, make sure that you are **ON TIME, IN CORRECT SCHOOL UNIFORM** and that you have <u>all</u> the necessary **EQUIPMENT** (including a spare pen). You might also need a CALCULATOR for some exams. Note: at least **one** external is needed in most courses to fulfil the requirements of **course endorsement**.

A more comprehensive school exam week will be held in Term 3, weeks 8 & 9, for all senior students to get a chance to practice and experience external NCEA exams as a practice.

The school days will run as normal, with students attending all normal classes unless they have an exam to attend.

Credits are on the rise!

We are over half way through the academic year, and we are pleased to see that credits are on the rise! In the last two months we have seen an increase of average credits across Year 11 (Level 1), Year 12 (Level 2) and Year 13 (Level 3). We would hope that students are carefully tracking their own credits too. We also suggest that students have about 30 credits, as well as their numeracy and literacy.

Remember that the system has changed this year. Each level needs 60 credits + their 10 literacy and 10 numeracy credits!

This group is aimed to raise confidence, and ability within numeracy while also encouraging the students to be leaders within their groups and support others. Next Friday (21st June) students in Year 9 & 10 will receive a one page report with their 'start of year' (SoY) data for reading, writing and numbers. This data is being shared so that whānau know how these essential skills are tracking. Students now need to pass a digital exam using their Numeracy, Reading and Writing Skills. Putāruru College is committed to ensuring our students are well supported and prepared to be successful in these exams. Sharing this data at the start and end of the year will help your own awareness of the support your child might need.


Bringing stories to life!














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
