

Staff vs Students challenge



Deputy Principal Jane Townsend raced in three races (W2, W6 womens, and W6 mixed) paddling a total of 64km. The W6 mixed team won the 24 km race by four minutes and the team were awarded gold medals. The team was called Korutanga/Coastal Pirates and represented the Tauranga Moana Outrigger Canoe Club.

When could I try again?


There is a second opportunity this year for students who fail or were not entered to try again. This will be in Week 8 & 9 of Term 3.



Street Talk consists of 8 hours of classroom theory and a 1 hour practical driving assessment, which is preparation for the Full Licence test.
